Universal PreKindergarten (UPK) brings more choices for preschool, including Transitional Kindergarten, to families.





Early learning programs put children on a path to succeed in school and be ready for college and careers

Research shows that children who attend preschool have:

- Improved self-control and ability to manage emotions
- Higher achievement in math and reading throughout elementary school
- Increased likelihood of high school graduation
- 1 Increased likelihood of a college degree

Preschool Choices Available for 3–5 Year Olds

Families can choose from a variety of preschool programs for their young children. Here's a breakdown of some of those choices:

UPK brings together all of these programs so families have more choices of high-quality learning programs that meet their needs.

UPK also connects before and afterschool and private care programs so families have options for a full day of care.







What UPK offers families

- All families in California—regardless of immigration & income status—are eligible to participate depending on your child's age and the program you select
- Transitional Kindergarten (TK) will be available to all 4year-old children for free
- More flexible, high-quality early education choices for their
 3- and 4-year-olds that address families' childcare needs*
- The opportunity to give input to make sure local UPK programs reflect your family's and community's needs and culture
- Schools that are ready to support your child's learning
- Assurance that your child is entering school equipped with the tools that will help them succeed

*Pending eligibility and other requirements



Things to Consider in Your Decision: Logistics

When you are deciding on the best preschool option for your child, here are some of the logistical things to consider:

- Is it full-day or part-day?
- If it's part-day, who will care for your child during the remainder of the day?
 - Are there other programs available (like a before and after school program or another childcare program) to care for your child or will you or a family member be available?
- Do they offer transportation?
- What is the cost of the program?
- Is your child eligible*?

*All 4-year-olds will soon be eligible for TK, but other programs may consider family income, whether your child speaks English at home, whether your child has a disability, and other factors as conditions for eligibility.

Your child can start Transitional Kindergarten (TK) at the beginning of the school year with the following birth dates.



Students born between Sep 2, 2018 and Apr 2, 2019

Can start TK in school year

Students born between Sep 2, 2020 and Aug 30, 2021

What your child should experience in a UPK program

Regardless of the UPK program your family chooses, your child should experience an environment where:

- Children of all abilities are supported and welcomed
- Each child's culture, race, identity, and language is respected
- Educators are ready to support dual language learners and encourage children to use their home language in the classroom
- Children are provided joyful learning that sparks their curiosity and sense of belonging
- Play-based learning activities are used to build the skills they need to succeed in TK-3rd Grade subjects







Supportive and welcoming environments for all children

California is working to make sure that all UPK classrooms will support children of all abilities, skill levels, and backgrounds by:

- Reserving spots in preschool classrooms specifically for children with disabilities, including 10% of all CA State Preschool spots by 2025
- Teaching educators about managing normal behavior in young children and how to include children of all abilities in activities
- Helping educators give children different ways to show what they've learned so they can build on their skills
- Ensuring all educators know how to support dual language learners and encourage students to use their home language in the classroom
